

## 'FADO' UP YOUR LIFE! LISBON'S SOULFUL SOUND JOINS THE STARS OF NOS ALIVE

Leading music festival will feature a fado stage for second year running



**20**<sup>th</sup> **December 2016** – Having recently celebrated five years since its inscription on the UNESCO Intangible Cultural Heritage list, <u>fado</u> music will once again be included in NOS Alive next year after featuring for the first time in the festival's 10-year history in July 2016. The inclusion of Lisbon's most distinctive sound alongside headline acts including the Foo Fighters, Alt J and Depeche Mode shows that *fado* is more 'alive' than ever as a new generation of singers – known as "young *fadistas"* – revitalise the iconic art form, placing it at the forefront of world music.

Haunting and poetic, *fado* is considered as one of the purest expressions of Lisbon's 'soul'. Believed to have its origins in the sorrow felt by the sailors and their families who were separated by Portugal's explorations around the globe in the 19<sup>th</sup> century, the mournful music of *fado* was inscribed on the <u>UNESCO Intangible Cultural Heritage</u> list in November 2011.

Popularised internationally by the great Amália Rodrigues (the "Queen of *fado*") in the 50-60's, a group of young *fadistas* have placed *fado* music back on the international music map. These young artists include <u>Mariza</u>, one of the nominees for "Best Portuguese Language Contemporary Pop Album" in last month's Latin Grammys; <u>Ana Moura</u>, who has performed with Mick Jagger and Prince; and <u>Gisela João</u>, one of today's most exciting voices. In July 2017 *fado* will have its own stage at <u>NOS Alive</u>, one of Portugal's top music festivals, for the second year in a row.

Experiencing a *fado* performance is a must for all visitors to Lisbon. The narrow streets of Alfama, the city's oldest district and most associated with this iconic song, is home to numerous "*fado* houses". Moving performances, whose themes very from love to death and from happiness to loneliness, are accompanied by the melancholy chords of the Portuguese guitar.



Alfama is also home to the <u>Fado Museum</u>, the best place to discover everything about *fado* and the Portuguese guitar. Here, visitors can learn about the history and evolution of Lisbon's native song and take part in a one-hour group workshop which concludes with participants singing their own *fados* – no embarrassment allowed. If they are really confident, visitors can then head to the Mouraria neighbourhood, next to Alfama, and try one of the houses offering *"fado* vadio" or 'amateur', where anybody can stand up and start singing!
